Hazel C. Loscomb of Easton, Maryland passed away on Tuesday, at The Pines-Genesis Center in Easton. She was 82 years old.

She was born on October 3, 1926 in Kentucky, daughter of the late Walter and Dora Alice Wilson Congleton.

She was the third of seven children. Her family moved to Baltimore during World War II, where she met and married William E. "Geezy" Loscomb of Oxford, MD. They were married on August 28, 1944. After the war they returned to Oxford to make their home. Hazel was a homemaker for many years and then went to work at McCrory's Five & Dime. She also worked at Shearer's Jewelry store and retired at the age of 80 from Harrison's Flowers where she had worked for many years.

She was preceded in death by her husband, William Loscomb and one brother, Charles Buford "Boots" Congleton.
